WEXFORD.—A marriage will take place early in October between Alfred Dover Delap of Rosslare Harbor, son of Canon Delap of Valentia, Kerry, and Jeanie Ethel, daughter of Thomas Jefferies of Newbury, Wexford, and Los Celbos, Uruguay.

The marriage of Mr. Tapley, Lecken, to Miss Mary Redmond, Barnard, attracted a large number to the Church of St. Michael's Aug. 28. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. Quigley. John Sinnott of Tinnacore, a farmer in the Kilmuckridge district, lately had a narrow escape from drowning. He was returning home from a friend's house, accompanied by Thomas Donohoe. The night was very dark, and, going through some fields, Mr. Sinnott told Donohoe that they were going the wrong way, and then Sinnott undertook to pilot. As Donohoe followed, what was his surprise to find that Mr.

Sinnott had walked into a wall hole and disappeared. Thoroughly alarmed, Mr. Donohoe shouted for help and light. Fortunately Owen Keboe and Mr. Corcoran of Westford heard the cries for help and hastened to the spot where the light was. They were not a minute too soon. They found Mr. Sinnott exhausted in the water, keeping his head above it by clinging to a branch of a tree. A rope was thrown to him, and he was dragged on to terra firma, suffering from fright and soaking wet, but all right otherwise.

WICKLOW.—James Maguire, laborer, aged sixty-one years, Redcross, seven miles from Arklow, was accidentally killed while training a young ass attached to a cart. The donkey became unmanageable and upset the vehicle, under which Maguire was pinned. When found by his two sons he was dead.

The dead body of Loughlin Conway, laborer, aged seventy years, Coolgreany, was found hanging from a tree near the house on Sept. 1. He was melancholy for some time, following the sudden death of his wife.

On Sept. 1 Little Bray was the scene of an inundation without parallel in the annals of the district. Toward 10 o'clock that night the river Dargle overran its banks and poured down into the town. The water continued to rise rapidly and before any organized attempt at rescue could be arranged it was rushing into and past the houses to a depth of ten feet. At midnight Little Bray was a place of the utmost desolation. The water was ten feet high, carrying with it the property of the unfortunate people whose houses were flooded. Some of the houses only projected from the water a few feet, while others were entirely submerged, only bubbles arising from the water as it rushed down the chimneys and openings indicating where the houses were.

Believing that he had reached Holyhead, a harvest man named Kelly, belonging to County Galway, traveling to Dublin, stepped out of a carriage into a tunnel near Bangor, Wales, Sept. 1, and was killed by an express. Another harvest man who was in the carriage with the deceased heard him say before stepping out, "Hurry up, let us go to work." The man was sick, probably with fever.

The Rev. J. Cahalan died on Aug. 22, aged seventy years.

On Aug. 19 an accident occurred in Bride street, Loughrea, by which Patrick Blake, formerly residing at Currocoo and at the time in the employment of Frank Ryan of Gurty-madden, lost his life. It was the horse fair day in Loughrea, and it appears that Blake was taking home a colt purchased by his master. While attempting to ride the colt the latter, rearing on its hind legs, toppled over, throwing its rider heavily. His head struck the curbstone, inflicting a nasty wound, while the horse rolled over his body, crushing him. He was picked up unconscious and removed to the infirmary, where he lived only a short time.

At Galway arrives recently Thomas Caserly, Charlestown, was charged with having unlawfully sent a letter to one Albertina Ryan, with a view of compelling her to give up grazing lands. He was found guilty. The judge reserved sentence for a few days.
