MAYO.—A novel experiment has been made in Claremorris by the Rev. Father McHugh, parish priest, who has established a parish court to deal with cases of tremass and nemonal squabbles between neighbors and thus obviate the expense of having them heard by the magistrates, with consequent ill feeling that afterward exists between the litigants. When any local dispute arises - a contention about mearings, claims for trespass and the like-the parties, instead of having resort to the English petty sessions, submit their grievance to the parish court. This is constituted of two arbitrators, who go into the merits of the issues and deal with them summarily. Where the arbitrators are men of influence who know all the circumstances, they are better able to get at the merits of the case and give an equitable decision.
