more branch of the Irish Industrial Development association held recently R. E. Goodbody, Dublin, stated that, accompanied by an American expert, he visited Randalstown, where Colonel Everard has ten acres of tobacco under process of saving and had never seen such a yield in any country, and the expert was of the same opinion. Leaves forty-two inches long and twenty-two inches wide could be seen, a size hitherto unknown. The yield of the ten acres was treble what was yielded by a twenty acre plot last year. The tobacco smoked well. In King's county the yield was not so heavy, but it would clear the expenses and was satisfactory for an experiment. The leaf was a nice brown one and made a class of tobacco not yet approached in Ireland. In Wexford, he said, the experiment was a failure. Colonel Everard, however, would make, including what was allowed by the government, \$250 an acre on his plot, but without the government assistance Mr. Goodbody was of the opinion that farmers had better keep to the growing of barley and oats. In reply to questions as to whether Irish made tobacco was now being used more than formerly Mr. Goodbody said the industrial revival movement had given Irish manufacturers great assistance.
