The splendid and representative gathering which assembled at Lyre on Martyrs' night to consecrate the memory of Allen, Larkin and O'Brien furnishes a significant proof that the spirit which animated the heroes whose blood has sanctified the cause of Ireland's freedom still lives on in the men of today. The celebration in memory of the Manchester martyrs, Allen, Larkin and O'Brien, took place in Bandon on Nov. 28.
