The ship was anchored in the Lough between Magheramorne and Millbay, and to reach her Kerr and his companions engaged small boat. They arrived at the schooner all right, and, having discharged their duties, they left in the little craft for the shore at 8 o'clock. It was pitch dark, and a strong gale was blowing. The circumstances of how the accident occurred will remain a mystery but at break of day the following morning the boat was found unturned at Islandmagee, near where the scheoner was anchored.
