Andrew Robinson of Hornhead, Dunfanaghy, left his home on the night of the 1st of January and has not been heard from since. Some weeks after his disappearance a cap and handkerchief which he wore were found on the shore at Hornbead. He was thirty-four years of age.

On Jan. 17 as children were returning home from school through a cracky defile in Carnagult they stopped to play on a grassy knoll near the summit of a ateep cliff. One of the children, a little boy nine years of age, missed his footing and toppled over the edge of the precipice. The cliff is a cloping one for the first thirty feet or so, below which it dies abruptly to a depth of over sixty feet. The child, powerless to restrain itself, alld down the slope until it reached this point, and just as the little fellow was about being precipitated over the perpendicular part of the cliff a dog which hitherto had scarcely been observed, caught him by the dress and held him until he was reached by his elder companions from his pertious position. The dog belongs to the child's father and had come out to meet the boy and his sisters. The incident created a sensation in the district being one of the most sagacious and remarkable on record. The name of the child was not given in the re-
