danced an Irish hornpipe. The enjoy-
able concert was concluded by all join-
ing in the spirited rendering of the na-
tional anthem, "God Save Ireland." After

Irish dances, reels, hornpipes, etc.,
formed the chief part of the pro-

The Derry Journal of Jan. 10 printed
the following: "That there is a cherub
which sits up aloft to watch over the
life of Jack has been exemplified in
the case of Seamus P. Henderson of
22 Foyle road, Derry, who signed ar-
ticles at Greenock on May 10, 1904, on
board the Greenock ship Pass of Mel-
fort, for a voyage from that port to
Sallina Cruz, via Newport, England, but
who, fortunately for himself and his
relatives, left the vessel at one of the

ports at which she called on the west
coast of South America, as his name
does not appear in the official list of
the crew published by the owners,
Messrs. Gibson and Clark of Glasgow,
who were drowned in the vessel
when wrecked on the west coast of
Vancouver island while on a voyage
from Panama to Puget sound in bal-
last. A large number of the original
crew who signed at Greenock were
either discharged or deserted at Port
Townsend or Panama, and it is prob-
able that young Henderson left the
ship at one of these ports. To this cir-
cumstance he may congratulate him-
self that he is alive instead of being at
the bottom of the ocean. When the
Pass of Melfort left Newport she was
under the command of Captain John
Houston, but while at Sallina Cruz he
died, and the charge of the vessel was
taken by the chief officer, Harry Scou-
gall, who was in command when she
was lost with all on board."
