A presentation took place recently to the Rev. Philip Byrne, a popular priest, who has labored for seven years in the Catholic mission at Islington and who has been recalled to his native diocese, Cashel. The presentation took the form of a check for \$400 and an illuminated address, prepared by Irish sisters and framed in Irish oak. Father Byrne expressed his intention of spending the money in the purchase of a horse and trap to assist him in discharging his ministerial duties in Ballyneety, to which parish he was appointed by the bishop of Cashel.

A conference of branches of the United Irish League of Mid-Tipperary was held lately at Knockavilla. Delegates attended from the following parishes: Annacarty, James Carew, secretary of Mid-Tipperary executive; Michael Ryan, John Ryan, L. Joyce, J. Hogan and Edward Ryan; Donaskeigh, Thomas Dwyer, John Hogan and Pat Ryan; Rossmore, L. Ryan, M. O'Dwyer and William Reilly; Cloncutty, John Casey, James Hammersley and others. On the motion of M. O'Dwyer, seconded by John Ryan, James Carew was moved to the chair, and John Hogan was appointed secretary. The chairman explained their object was to consider the untenanted lands on the De Montalt property and the necessity for placing the young men of the locality, the sons of farmers and laborers, on these lands. By this means they would prevent emigration and give the young men a means of living in their own country. He proposed the following resolution, a copy of which was sent to the estates commissioners: "Holding the opinion that the only way to stop emigration is to give to the class who emigrate a living at home, this conference calls on the estates commissioners not to give the untenanted lands of Dundrum (if such lands become available for distribution) to any person who has a means of livelihood already, while there are many young men in the locality who have no prospect before them unless they get a foothold in their own country by planting them on the above mentioned lands." The resolution was seconded by William Reilly and passed. Proposed by W. Reilly and seconded by Laurence Ryan, "That the secretary of the estates committee, M. O'Dwyer, be instructed to summon a meeting of the De Montalt tenants."

During a heavy sea a canoe containing a number of market folk returning from Galway attempted to make a landing at Inismain island, when a huge wave caught the craft broadside, carrying away the oars and leaving the crew at the mercy of the breakers. A moment later a heavy sea was shipped, and the canoe turned turtle, leaving its occupants struggling in the water. All hope seemed over until the Rev. Father Higgins arrived. Observing the danger, he succeeded in allaying the panic and with coolness directed the operations of a rescue party. His timely arrival resulted in their rescue in an unconscious condition. The application of first aid was immediately resorted to and after a painful interval proved efficacious. The contents of the canoe—four bushels, a quantity of cowhide and four—were lost.
