## Five Minute Sermon

The Resurrection of Our Lord

In regard to the day, which was the first day of the week, we are to recognize that day of the Lord which afterward was to be the holy day of the Christian Church, on which we also should devote ourselves to works of religion and bring balm to Jesus Christ.

Finally, in the fact that the sun had risen, we see that a soul that sincerely seeks the glory of God will remain in darkness, ignorance, or doubt, but will always find the light that comforts and guides it in all its steps. If, according to the laws of nature, the sun had risen, it had also risen according to the laws of grace because Christ had already risen from the dead, and by His resurrection bestowed the full light of the Gospel, confirmed the true faith, and brought the day of life to the whole world.
