ANTRIM-A sad accident occurred recently at Ballykeel, near Larne. Two brothers named Barr, aged ten and five years, were amusing themsolves in an outhouse, playing at having a "circus." How the accident happened is not known, but in some way the elder brother was hanged by a rope which he had around his neck. life being extinct when assistance arrived.

A young man named Frank Buck was recently walking over the highest portions of the ('ave hill, Beifast, and fell over a precipice. He struck the ground with dreadful force, sustaining injuries of a terrible nature. He was removed to a lumpital but never regained conscionsness and died. Deceased resided at East Dulwich, in South London, and had only arrived in Belfast on a visit to his parents.
