KNIGHTS WILL NOT PARADE.

Commanderies Decide Not To Enter Procession on Memorial Day.

The Knights of St. John have announced that they will not participate in the parade on Memorial Day. This decision is a departure from a custom which the knights have observed for several years, but at a meeting of officers of the grand commandery it was agreed that the knights should take no part this year. The reason assigned for the decision is a depletion of ranks. Two of the best drilled companies will not be in the city next Wednesday, and the knights feel that they could not do themselves justice with this shortage. The Knights of St. Eustace and the Knights of St. Mauritius will be the absentees. Both commanderies go to North East, Pa., where they will compete in the prize drill.

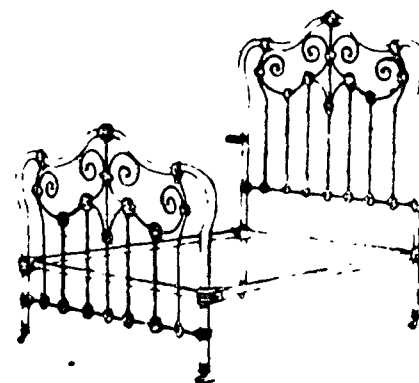
