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## Five Minute Sermon

The Disciples are Commissioned to Preach

Christ upbraided His apostles for their weakness of faith that He might humble them, and thus prepare them for the most sublime mission ever given to man. They were to preach to all men, who under pain of condemnation were bound to believe their teaching, and have faith in things that appear not to the senses. If, then, the apostles themselves were incredulous and hard-hearted, how could they expect their hearers to be converted? Therefore they must be models in firmness of faith and in sorrow for past indifference or unbelief.

No one should assume the office of preaching unless he has been commissioned to do so by divine authority. Therefore, it was necessary that Our Lord should send His apostles to preach that their words might have His sanction and authority. For He said to them: "As the Father hath sent Me I also send you." They were to go into the whole world to show Christ's willingness to save all men; to convince the world of the boundless love of the Son of God, Who came to redeem not one race or people, but the whole human race in the past, present, or future existence of its members. By "every creature" we are to understand all men. Man is the noblest of God's works, and comprises in his nature the perfections of all created things inferior to himself. In common with minerals he exists, with plants lives, with animals feels.

Though Christ had been preaching for three years or more, when He ascended into heaven the members of the Church were very few. After the descent of the Holy Ghost, the apostles met with miraculous success in their preaching, converting their hearers in thousands by a single sermon. Our Lord permitted this to show that the success of the apostles was not due to their own power—for certainly they were not greater than Christ Himself—but to the power of God, Who uses the weak things of this world to confound the strong. Thus in a comparatively short time the true faith was established in almost every quarter of the then known world.

## WASHINGTON LETTER

### Congressional Views on Sherman's March to the Sea

Washington, D. C., May 28.

President Roosevelt's action in ordering back the troop of soldiers that were going over the former route of General Sherman in his march to the sea was both timely and proper. There was no particular objection to the inspection of the route by a body of soldiers for the purpose of studying military tactics, there was no particular objection to Father Sherman's presence in the capacity of guest, but there was very serious objection to the whole business on account of the awful memories it revived. Battle fields have frequently been visited by northern and southern veterans, and no outcry was heard about it, for there deeds of valor were recalled and individual instances of bravery of both friend and foe were discussed without bitterness of feeling. These reminiscences now become pleasant through the ameliorating influences of time, were in fact the best part of these pleasurable trips.

But how was it with Sherman's march to the sea? It might have been a military necessity, and it might have been excusable on that ground, but it was the most destructive, the most brutal, and the most pitiless performance during the Civil War. There was no Lee to block the way, nor a Jackson, nor any other worthy of his steel, only women, and children, and old negroes, and Sherman's army simply marched along, and burnt the homes and the barns in a belt of country almost 30 miles in breadth, with helpless women and children shrieking in terror at the awful catastrophe.

And now we are wondering that the Southern people should protest against a revival of the terrible scenes that many remember as children. Let us by all means visit battle fields, for there is a certain inspiration in that, but who, except a brute, would want to glaze over the agonies of helpless human beings, whose only weapon against the pillaging and burning foe was a cry for pity. Sherman himself afterwards declared that he had destroyed ten times more than he needed for his own supplies, and people in that section say that hardly a house or barn had been left standing in the whole course of his march. Now, this might have been a military necessity but for Heaven's sake let us draw a veil over that scene forever.

The general idea of members of Congress with whom I talked on the subject is that this episode of the war was unquestionably barbarous and inhuman, and that it was difficult to understand by the lay mind. They were satisfied, however, that there must have been a grave reason for it, since Lincoln and Grant approved it. Said one representative: "With his tender heart and compassionate nature, it must have been a hard wrench for Lincoln to sign that order, and I can see him now hesitating, with a reluctant pen in his hand."

There has not been a single opinion expressed here, either by northern or southern men, that either the general giving the order for this trip, or Father Sherman in accepting an invitation to accompany the expedition, had any idea or intention of reviving old animosities. The protests which came thick and fast soon after the order was given, and the march had been begun, were the first intimation to them that other memories than those of a battle were being awakened by the proposed trip.

## THE CHURCH OF ROME.

### Its Power Over Its People a Puzzle to Its Opponents.

It is estimated that the Catholics in London number 200,000, and their body includes practically the entire Irish element of the population, just as the Presbyterian church counts among its adherents most of those of Scottish birth. Many of these immigrants from the sister isle are to be found among the very poorest of the slums and, according to Charles Booth, constitute in that stratum of the population "a class apart, being, as a rule, devout and willing to contribute something from their earnings toward the support of their schools and the maintenance of their religion."

It is one of the strangest characteristics of the Church of Rome that she alone among the denominations has discovered the secret of grappling to herself with books of steel men and women from every rank of society and every grade of culture. Whatever their worldly position, whatever their degree of intellectual development, her power over them is a real and binding one.

It is only those with some personal knowledge of her adherents who have any idea of the diversity of individual conviction which attains repose under the apparently rigid and unbending system by which her authority is exercised. Yet, though she is perhaps the most varied as well as the most united and compact force in the religious world and though there is a general tendency to follow her example of pressing the arts into her service, her converts are not numerous. On the other hand, oddly enough, when they do come it is usually from the affluent and highly educated classes, and not a few of the most cultured skeptics turn to her at last in their despair and become her zealous supporters.—London Telegraph.
