Ulster

ANTRIM.—A fire occurred recently in the premises of Henry Carson, tailor and general draper, Church street, Balilena. The fire was communicated to the store of Robert Milliken, general dry goods, and \$40,000 worth of property was destroyed.

The County Down constabulary have been investigating an extraordinary outrage a few miles outside Belfast. A well known Ulster footballer named McCann, cycling in the neighborhood of Shaw's bridge, was attacked by several men, who, after knocking him down, kicked his face into pulp and fractured his nose. Before leaving him unconscious on the roadside they relieved him of his gold watch, chain and 20 shillings. McCann lay in a hospital in a critical condition.

The annual meeting of St. Patrick's Catholic Orphan society was recently held in St. Malachy's college, Belfast, under the presidency of Most Rev. Dr. Henry. There was a large and representative attendance of the clergy of Down and Connor. The reports were satisfactory. Very Rev. P. Convery proposed the election of Very Rev. Dr. Laverty and Rev. J. K. O'Neill, administrator, St. Patrick's, as honorable treasurer and honorable secretary respectively, which was agreed to unanimously. ARMAGH.—A meeting of mid-Armagh divisional executive was held here lately under the presidency of P. Watters, president. The following branches were represented, the attendance of delegates being full: Armagh, Keady, Derrynoose, Grange, Kilmore, Tullysarron and Middletown. On the motion of P. Hughes, county delegate, seconded by P. Mone, resolutions were unanimously passed expressing confidence in the Irish Parliamentary party, led by John E. Redmond, M. P., and calling on all the branches in the division to take up the Parliamentary party collection; (2) tendering the thanks of the executive to the Irish News for the services rendered to the National cause in Ulster, and (3) hoping that the Nationalists of Ulster would render all the assistance in their power to Dermot O'Brien, the organizer, in his efforts to place the National organization on a firm footing. On the motion of Hugh McGahan, seconded by Francis Donnelly, a resolution was passed agreeing with Cardinal Logue in condemning the present system of primary education in the national schools.

The death of Rev. Thomas O'Neil, Loughcall, took place on April 18. GAVAN.—The houses and premises in the possession of T. W. Cochrane and Mrs. Donovan, Lower Bridge street, Belturbet, and that in which Mr. McMurtry conducted a jewelry business were destroyed by fire on April 17.

The death of an advanced age, of James McGonilla took place on April 16 at Main street, Gavan. In the king's court, Dublin, lately, in the case of Crookenden and another versus Owen Maguosty and others, Mr. Longworth applied on behalf of the plaintiffs, M. M. Crookenden and another, in actions against Owen Maguosty, Michael Maguosty, Farrell Maguosty, Michael McLoughlin and Margaret Kearney, for an order to substitute service of five writs of summons for rent on defendants. Counsel relied on the affidavit of Michael Maguire of Carricknagrew, civil bill officer, who stated that, having been instructed by the plaintiffs' solicitors to serve the writs on March 12 last, he went to Teebane, the residence of the defendants. He was unable to serve them personally owing to the presence of a number of people who followed and threatened him with violence. When he came near the house of Bridget McGowan of Tullynamoill he saw 800 men on the hills adjoining. They began to beat drums and blow horns when he came in sight. About twenty ran to meet him and shouted that they should catch him and take the writs from him. He was, he said, riding a good horse and only because he galloped away at the speed of fifteen miles an hour, the mob following him for two-and-a-half, he believed he would have lost his life and that if he attempted to serve the writs in the ordinary way his life would be endangered. His lordship made the order for substitution by letters through the postoffice addressed to the several defendants.

Early on the morning of April 12 James W. Parke, a farmer of Craigs-Orritor, Cookstown, informed the Cookstown police that when going into town for seeds that morning he had been shot at. Later he pointed out as the man who fired the shots a young man named Patrick Mallon, who was attending a funeral. Head Constable Linn arrested Mallon, who belongs to Dlinan, in Lissan parish, a few miles from Cookstown. Mallon was brought before W. Smith, charged with having fired at James W. Parke with the intention of killing him and was held for trial.

There has been erected in the Newtownstewart cemetery to the order of the Very Rev. Dean Morris, Canada, a member of an old and honored Tyrone family, a monument to the memory of his mother, the late Mrs. Margaret Morris. The monument is a beautifully carved Celtic cross of Carrara marble. It rests on a splendid plinth of the best Newry granite, ordered and prepared by the sculptor, B. J. Taylor, Omagh, who designed and executed the work. The cross is in the old style, modeled on that magnificent relic of ancient Irish art, the cross of Monasterboice. The interlacements are beautifully done, and at the lower end of the cross is the figure of St. Cecilia. The inscription runs: "Of your charity pray for the soul of Margaret Morris, who died Nov. 8, 1898, R. I. P. Erected by her son, Rev. Dean Morris, St. Catherine's, Canada."

We pledge our support to the Irish Parliamentary party as the only one able to obtain redress of our grievances in parliament."
