Eastman to be Held

Judge Benton Sustains Demurrer but Finds Defendant Entitled to In-

vestigation for Libel.

In sustaining the demurrer to the ndictment against Bishop Newton A.L. Eastman of the Gospel Workers of America, Judge Benton files a lengthy opinion on the case and concludes by finding that, while the acts alleged do not constitute the orime charged they are prima facie against "the peace of the people" and the matter should be submitted to another grand jury. Accordingly under the criminal code, it is direct-

ed that the case be submitted to the next grand jury of the county and the defendent's bail be held answerable for his appearance to answer a new indictment if found. Judge Benton holds that Bishop Eastman's alleged "obscene" article is within the law, so far as its presumed indecencies are concerned, but that the author is distinctly liable for libel. Though no individual is referred to in the article in question it is the Court's opinion that the crime of libel is none the less, but rather more serious, when connected against an organized body. Many cases are cited in which judgments have been returned against individuals convicted of libeling churches, regiments and

other organizations. It will be remembered that Eastman was indicted by the Grand Jury for publishing slanderous statements regarding the church.
