### Handsome New Building

Rochester is becoming more beautiful every day. Streets in every direction are being paved and improved and many new buildings are going up. Our reporter noticed one handsome structure on Edinburgh street that is being erected by Thos. B. Mooney, the undertaker. The building will cost about \$6,000 and will be one of the most complete undertaking establishments in the city. There will be a funeral chapel 14x38 ft. leading from a hall 7x36 ft. on the left and a reception room and office each 15 feet square on the right. In the rear of these rooms will be reading, chair, trimming and embalming rooms, with a large carriage room, 24 ft. square, in the rear. On the second story will be one of the finest show rooms in the state, 36 feet square. The building will be furnished with electric lights throughout. Mr. Mooney expects to have the building completed by Aug. 1st.

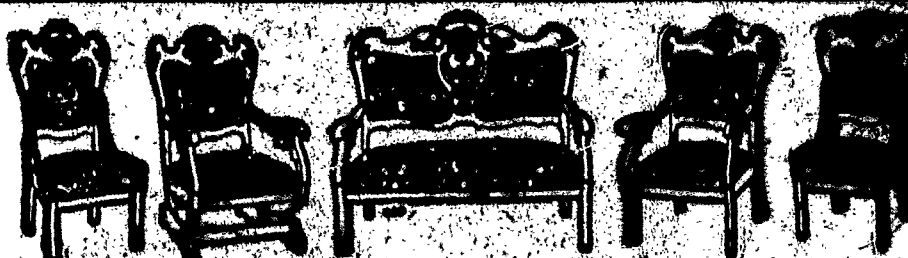
