ANTRIM.—The various weaving factories in Belfast, closed in consequence of the strike of the operatives, who demand an increase in wages, were opened one day to give the strikers an opportunity of resuming work, but they declined to return and the establishments were closed. The strike has extended to several Ulster towns and 20,000 workers are idle
