LOUTH.—Dr. Douglas Hyde in his address at the recent Gaelic feis, Castlebellingham, said if he (Dr. Hyde) had not been able to assure America that the Gaelic league movement stood far away ahead and beyond and above all sections, creeds, politics and parties he might as well have stayed at home. He was able to assert that their movement had within the last few years doubled the output of their linen and woolen mills, doubled the output of their paper mills and increased all the minor industries of Ireland. As long as Ireland be allowed to develop upon the lines that come naturally and instinctively to her, no limit could be placed on what she might arrive at in art, industry and commerce.

In the town hall, Liverpool, recently, in the presence of the lord mayor and a representative company of the municipality, Thomas Flanagan of Kelly's lane, Drogheda, was presented with an address for heroism as second officer of the steamer British King, which foundered in the Atlantic in March last. The address was illuminated and read as follows: "At the meeting of the council of the Mercantile Marine Service association held at 67 Tower buildings, Water street, on May 17, 1905, it

was resolved unanimously that the thanks of the council be presented to Thomas Flanagan of the steamship British King of Liverpool for heroic devotion to duty and meritorious services on the occasion of the wrecking of the vessel in the north Atlantic on the night of March 11 last." The chief officer and twenty-seven of the crew lost their lives on the sad occasion. Mr. Flanagan, the chief engineer and three others, after heroic efforts to save the vessel, were rescued with much difficulty from their posts of duty.

MEATH.—Notwithstanding the adverse state of the weather on July 1, the Navan branch of the Gaelic league is proud of the results of the Feis na Mílte. The attendance was large, the excursion trains from Dublin, Kingscourt, Oldcastle and intermediate stations being availed of by competitors and Gaelic leaguers. There were 1,000 entries, and the turnstiles of the industrial exhibition, held on the show grounds, registered 492 admissions, apart from the exhibitors and those entitled to free entry. There were six bands and six choirs, and the competitions were well contested.

GALWAY.—Miss Sabina Morris of Prospect hill, Galway city, died on June 2.

A new or rather a revived industry will soon be in working order in Galway—the manufacture of iodine. There was in former years a fine iodine factory in halmyer between Galway and Menlo castle, the beautiful residence of the famous Blake family.

On July 4, while first mass was being celebrated in Dungan Church, County Leitrim, a portion of the ceiling recently erected gave way, injuring a large number of worshippers. The injuries were so serious that those hurt were conveyed to Carrick-on-Shannon infirmary. They are progressing favorably. About forty people were more or less severely hurt.

St. John's night was observed here in the customary manner in Ballinaglera. The young men, numbering 400, assembled at the quarters of the local band, where a torchlight procession was formed, and the crowd marched to Drummalinagh hill, where a large bonfire was lit. Dancing and singing went on till dawn appeared, when all dispersed to their homes. Owing to the site of the bonfire being in close proximity to an excited farm six policemen were present during the night.

Passing the cathedral along the line there was intense enthusiasm displayed. Rev. J. Gallagher, administrator, said he wished Dr. Douglas Hyde a cordial welcome with all the sincerity of his heart. Several addresses of welcome were read to him, to which he replied in appropriate terms. Stephen Gwynn also spoke. At the conclusion of the meeting Frank Dorr welcomed an "Craobhina" on behalf of the Foxford branch of the Gaelic league. Dr. Hyde was then escorted to the residence of Mrs. John Dillon, who, with her children, is staying in Ballaghaderreen.
