For Measuring Space.

An apparatus for measuring the seventy millionth part of an inch has been made by Dr. P. Shaw of Nottingham University, England. works upon the principle of electric touch, and consists of a fine micrometer screw and six levers. The apparatus is so sensitive and delicate that it is impossible to manipulate it before an audience. It is hung by rubber bands, covered with thick felt, and must be worked at dead of night, when there is no traffic or factory working. The smallest distance that this mechanism measures is about the distance between a solid and liquid molecule. Dr. Shaw's invention was first made in 1900, but its great improvement of late has such huge quantities of metal dust made it the wonder of physicists throughout the world.


