Blessing the Graves

Large Attendance at Cemetery Sunday Afternoon

Thousands of persons went to the cometery by trolley and in carriages and automobiles last Sunday to attend the annual blessing of graves.

Before the blessing of the graves the vespers of the dead were recited in the chapel. Bishop McQuaid was the celebrant and was assisted by Father Dietrich Laurenzis, M. R., and Father A.M.O'Neill, M.R. The service was attended by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, all the Rochester priests, the students of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's Seminaries and such of the people as could be accommodated.

Dr. A B. Meehan of St. Bernard's Seminary, was master of ceremonies in the chapel and the procession that immediately followed the chapel service. During the procession the priests and students sang the "De Profundis" and "Miserere," while the Bishop sprinkled holy water upon the graves. At the close of his address Bishop McQuaid gave the people his episcopal blessing, during which they knelt together and the 'Benedictus' was sung by the priests and students.
