A requiem mass was offered on Tuesday morning for the souls for whom the mass was offered on All Souls' Day.

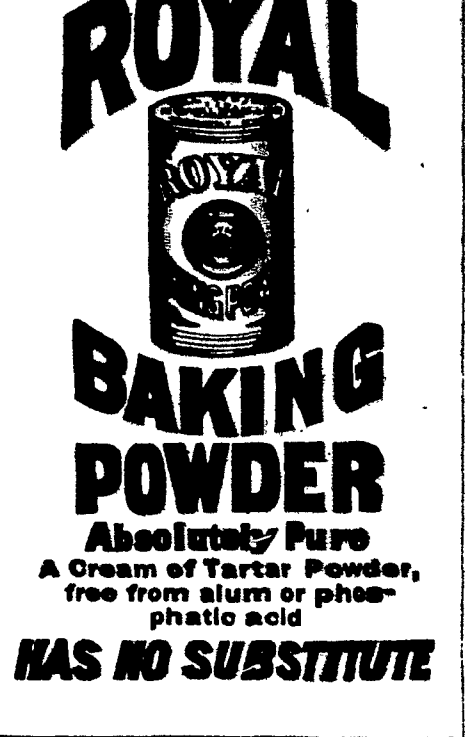

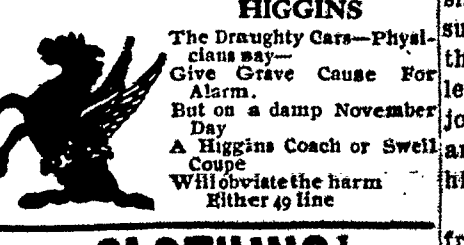
