## Around the Globe

### Catholic News From Many Places

In five years, the increase in the population of the German Empire was 4,274,100 souls. The Catholic population is 22,000,000.

The golden jubilee of Pius X. will be celebrated next year. The Holy Father has finally given his consent but stipulates that all the offerings shall go to the support of the impoverished church of France.

The Archbishop of Montreal last week waged a terrific war upon the barrooms of his See-city. The Montreal saloonkeepers report that there was a great falling off in their business on last New Year's day and they blame Archbishop Bruchesi for it.

The Trans-Continental Passenger Association, in session at Chicago, has decided to continue to give free or reduced transportation to Nuns and Brothers of Religious orders, but will refuse the courtesy to the agents of W.C.T.U., Y.M.C.A. and kindred societies. "Only Catholics Ride Free" is the heading given to the dispatch which conveys the information.

The Archbishop of Rheims, in a protest addressed to the Government Receiver, characterizes the law under which that official is taking over Church property as unjust, impious and sacrilegious.

Archbishop Blenk has secured a suitable hall at the Confederate Soldiers' Home, New Orleans, to be used as a chapel for the celebration of Mass every Sunday at the Home.

Rev. Ambrose Goulet, whose death occurred at Santa Barbara, Cal., a few days ago, at the age of 85 years had been married before he became a priest. On the death of his wife, he studied for the priesthood and was ordained by the late Archbishop Foley. His only son, Rev. Joseph Goulet, also entered the priesthood. Father Goulet celebrated his last Mass on Christmas day.

Rev. Richard D. Slewin, S. J., of St. Louis, the new president of Detroit College, comes of a religious family, having three sisters, who are Nuns. Two are Ursulines, one in Montana and another in Cincinnati, and the oldest is Madame Rose Slewin of the Ladies of the Sacred Heart at Lake Forest, Ill.

Rev. Martin S. Brennan, professor of astronomy at Kenrick Seminary, has ordered one of the largest telescopes ever mounted upon a tripod. Father Brennan is pastor of St. Lawrence O'Toole's church, and professor at Kenrick Seminary fifteen years. He will use the instrument in connection with his teaching. The tube is 6 inches in diameter and will be about 10 feet in length. The lens is a powerful one, capable of magnifying an object 900 times.

Members of the Knights of Columbus are interested in a measure introduced in Congress last week by Congressman H. O. Young of Ishpeming, Mich., designed to set aside October 12 as a national holiday, to be known as Columbus day. The agitation for the legalizing of the anniversary of Columbus as a national holiday was begun by a council of Knights of Columbus at Hancock, Mich., and the bill was introduced in response to a petition from that council.
