On Good Friday the Mass of the Presanctified will be at 9 A. M.

On Holy Saturday the services will be at the same hour.

Time Resisting Cedars.
Cedar wood is much esteemed by farmers for its lasting qualities, when used for fence posts.

An interesting proof of the power of this wood to resist the effects of time is furnished by the Egyptian boats made of cedar which were recently found buried near the banks of the Nile, and which, according to recent estimates of their age, were probably in use 4,500 years ago.

The fact must not be overlooked, however, that these boats were covered by the dry sand of the desert.

Honey Production in Spain.
There are 1,000,000 beehives, producing 10,000 tons of honey in Spain, which is the second greatest producer of honey in the world. Germany, with 2,000,000 beehives, produces 20,000 tons.

HOME COOKING.

Glazed Sweet Potatoes.
Five sweet potatoes, one egg, half cupful of sugar, half teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of butter. Pare and cut the potatoes in strips; steam until nearly done. Remove from the fire and cool. Dip in egg beaten with the salt, then in the sugar, coating each strip thickly. Place in the pan with the butter and bake a rich brown.

Virginia Sweet Potatoes.
Boil the sweet potatoes for 20 minutes, remove from the fire, peel and cut them into slices. Put a layer of sweet potatoes, then cover with sugar and cinnamon; continue this until the dish is full, making the last layer of sugar. Then pour over the top a teaspoonful of hot water, in which has been melted a tablespoonful of butter. Bake in the oven until brown.

Ginger Pudding.
Mix together four ounces each of bread-crumbs, suet and preserved ginger, with two well-beaten eggs. Add two tablespoons of ginger syrup and steam three hours.

Zenda Pudding.
Two ounces of flour, two ounces of bread-crumbs and two of suet; mix with four and a half ounces of grated coconut, two ounces of sugar, the yolks of three eggs and half a gill of milk. Steam one hour and serve with foamy sauce.

Hickory Nut Cake.
Here is a good recipe for hickory nut cake: Cream a cupful of sugar, half a cupful of butter and add the yolks of two eggs. Sift together two cupfuls of flour, a teaspoonful of soda. Make a cavity in the center of the flour and pour the other ingredients into it, gradually mixing all together. Add a cupful of hickory nuts and raisins minced; lastly the whites of two eggs. Add just a little milk if the butter needs more moistening. Bake in broad, shallow pans, cut into squares and frost, decorating the top of each square with three hickory nut meats.

New Way to Bake Potatoes.
Take off the rear covers of your range and place the potatoes in the space on top of the oven and replace the covers. It is well to turn them when about half done; the drafts of the stove may be left closed, and in an hour or less the potatoes are evenly baked. This with no watching or extra fire.

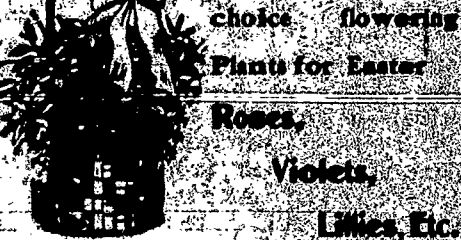
