### News From Ireland

ANTRIM.

Out of 185 cases reported 104 deaths have occurred in Belfast since the first outbreak of spotted fever.

The sudden demise of Sir Daniel Dixon, Bart., M. P., which took place while the honorable member was walking to church on Sunday has created a vacancy in the Parliamentary representation of North Belfast. At the general election in January, 1906, Sir Daniel stood as a Conservative. He was opposed by Mr. William Walker as a Labor candidate. The latter polled 4,616 votes to the 4,907 secured by the deceased baronet. Since then the Labor position, it is learned, has been strengthened in the constituency, and the factor of the district personal popularity, in Sir Daniel Dixon's case, cannot obtain in anything like the same degree. Therefore the forthcoming electoral contest should prove interesting. Sir Daniel Dixon was for close on thirty years prominently identified with the public offices of Belfast, and was elected Chief Magistrate of the city no less than seven times. In 1892 he received knighthood. He was also Chief Magistrate of Belfast during 1903, 1905 and 1906. In the former year he was created a Baronet of the United Kingdom, and he was also made a member of the Irish Privy Council. Sir Daniel, who was sixty-three years of age, was born in Larne, and is succeeded in the title by his eldest son, Mr. T. J. Dixon.

ARMAGH.

At Armagh Assizes, before Mr. Justice Andrews, an appeal from the decision of his Honor, Judge Kisbey, at Lurgan was heard. Messrs. J. B. Ferguson and Co., automobile engineers, Little Donegal Street, Belfast, sued Joseph Cordner, cycle agent, Market Street, Lurgan, to recover £7 10s 2d for work and labor done to a motor tri-car, defendant's property. Defendant counterclaimed £11 3s for damage sustained to said motor car through being negligently driven by one of plaintiff's servants, so that it collided with a coal cart in Belfast. His Honor dismissed both the claim and counterclaim on the merits. Mr. Justice Andrews, on rehearing the case, decided that Messrs. Ferguson had done the work for which payment was claimed in a satisfactory manner, and that they were not liable for the injury sustained by the car after being handed over to defendant. The counterclaim was dismissed on the ground that the driver was not in Messrs. Ferguson's employment. Judgment was accordingly given for plaintiffs for the amount claimed, with costs.

CARLOW.

The custom which came into vogue in recent years through the efforts of the Gaelic League of displaying Irish manufactured goods during Irish-Ireland week, prevails in many places in Ireland, and is attended with excellent results. We should like, says the Carlow Nationalist, to see the shopkeepers of Carlow following the examples of those places. The national festival falls on a Sunday this year, so that shopkeepers could celebrate the event in a very practical way by a display of Irish goods on the following day. The large drapery houses in the cities report that as a result of the display there has been lately an increased demand for Irish made goods on the part of the public. Shopkeepers in Carlow and other towns in Leinster, therefore, would do well to follow suit.

MAYO.

The ordination of Rev. James P. Conry, eldest son of Mr. John M. Conry, merchant, Ballyhannis, took place in the Irish College, Rome, on March 16th. The solemn and impressive ceremony was performed by his Eminence Cardinal Pietro Respighi, Vicar of his Holiness Pius X., in the basilica of St. John Lateran, and he celebrated his first Mass in the crypt of St. Peter's on St. Patrick's Day. Father Conry commenced his studies in St. Jarlath's College, and after a successful career, entered St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, where he won further distinctions. With the kind permission of his Grace Most Rev. Dr. Healy, Archbishop of Tuam, he went to Rome three and a half years ago, where he has since been a distinguished student in the Irish College.

SLIGO.

Mr. James Rowan, a prominent resident of Sligo town for the past fifteen years, and well known in commercial, social and sporting circles, was the recipient of congratulatory address from a number of Sligo's prominent citizens recently on the occasion of his departure for his home at Monivea, Atherry. His Honor, Mayor Michael Keane, presided.


