At Ontario Beach Park

New Arrangement of the Grounds Provides Much Additional Space

Fully 15,000 people journeyed to Greater Ontario Beach Park last Sunday to inspect the progress of the building of the new resort. A large crowd is again looking for this Sunday should the weather be propitious, as the interest created in the enterprise is widespread. The park is within three or four weeks of receiving its completing touches and the entrance, etc., to the pleasure city, ornate as it is, gives but a faint idea of the breadth of the operations now under way beyond its boundary and vouchsafes only a hint of the manifold features in course of preparation.

The present stage of the enterprise bears abundant testimony that the "glory pictures" painted by the projectors were amply justified and that the promises of a recreation place on a greater scale than was heretofore attempted in Western New York, are on the eve of fulfillment.

The new management of the resort has proved to be a distinct surprise to crowds of Rochesterians, who, made curious by the magnitude of the plans and the radical departure by the management from the policy under which the park was conducted in preceding years, have made week-day and Sunday lake jaunts for the purpose of inspecting the rapid progress.

The first thing to impress the visitor after passing the massive gateway is the large amount of additional space that has been secured by the new management. Where, as obtained in the former layout of the grounds the park presented a restricted view, the appearance to-day is one of immensity and provides for long vistas of avenues and pathways.

At the western extremity of the grounds are located the buildings of the "Fire and Flames" exhibition. Directly back of the fronts have been erected the grand stands for the accommodation of the large audiences, which there is every reason to believe will be attracted by this spectacle. Facing these stands are the buildings and streets of the attraction; these being so arranged as to convey to beholders the impression that they are actually gazing upon a section of a large city teeming with the hum of life and where there are being enacted scenes of everyday occurrence in the heart of a great metropolis. Dwelling houses, stores, shops, tenements and flats are reproduced with fidelity to detail and the whole, when peopled by hundreds of supernumeraries representing all walks of life, and with street cars making frequent trips throughout the mimic city, will complete the illusion and hold the spectator within its thrall.

The fire barn of this feature is located at the northern end of the fronts and will be equipped with "quick-hitch" apparatus, sliding poles and all the appurtenances of an up-to-date fire house, even to sleeping rooms for the chief and his battalion of fire fighters. An idea of the attention bestowed upon the details of "Fire and Flames" may be gathered from the fact that checker boards, cards and other games are provided with which the battalion may while away its idle hours, as is common with life in actual city fire departments.

The Venetian Waterways will occupy that part of the grounds bounded by the old entrance and the plot where formerly stood the Magic Swings. Upon the surface of these artificial canals will be gondolas in which pleasure-seekers may glide through an abundance of color or to the strumming of guitars and mandolins in the hands of the swarthy gondoliers.

Within the boundaries of the lake midway the Ontario Beach Amusement Company has provided for diversified forms of entertainment that will appeal to a wide range of tastes. Situated here will be enchanted ground, the Galveston flood, palace of illusions, love's journey, house that Jack built, the German village, Delphic oracle, tours of the world, ye olde English inn, scenic railway pavilion, and minor features, such as cream cone walks, penny arcades, shooting galleries and carousels.

The electrical illuminating phases of the park will be the subject of much attention on the projectors' part and already plans have been evolved the carrying out of which will mean that the resort will, nightly, be transformed into a blaze of dazzling light. Myriads of electric lamps will arch the walks and be festooned on the buildings and the effect will produce a scene that will remain long in the memory of the onlooker.

SALE IN AID OF ST. ANN'S HOME

Reception to be Held to Reduce Debt on Catholic Institution.

With a laudable ambition to assist in diminishing the debt which hangs over St. Ann's Home on the Charlotte boulevard, some of the aged women who are inmates of the home have been at work making quilts, aprons, holders and other household articles, which are to be offered for sale at a reception to be held under the patronage of committees of women from all of the Catholic parishes in the city who wish to assist the Rev. Mother Eusebius in her work for the care and comfort of the old people of the home.

There will be committees to take charge of the sale, others to show visitors about and explain the workings of the home, and the Victorian Circle, as auxiliary of the home, will be in charge of the refreshments. The public is invited to attend the reception and view the home. There are now 121 women and twenty-one men at the home.

Early Incandescent Lamps.

The earliest incandescent electric light lamps contained 75 cents worth of platinum, and were blown by hand. At the present time the amount of this precious metal is reduced to a few cents' worth, and the bulbs are blown in large quantities by machinery at a cost of 2 cents each. The average cost of these lamps is now 18 cents, despite the fact that there are fifty different processes involved in their manufacture.

Origin of Oxygen.

Lord Kelvin once showed that all the oxygen in the atmosphere probably came from the action of sunlight on plants. When the earth was a globe of hot liquid it contained no vegetable fuel, and probably no free oxygen. But as it cooled off plants appeared on its surface and these began to evolve oxygen through the medium of the sunbeams. Upon the oxygen thus derived we depend for the maintenance of life by breathing.

Oldest Bank Notes.

The oldest banknotes in the world are the "flying money," or convenient money, first issued in China in 2697 B. C. One writer tells that the ancient Chinese bank notes were in many respects similar to those of the present day, bearing the name of the note, the signature of the official who issued it, and its value, in both figures and words. On the top of these curious notes was the following philosophic injunction: "Produce all you can, spend with economy."
