One of the features of the season will be basket ball. Last year the club had a representative team, and this year as soon as the men have been afforded an opportunity to practice challenges will be sent to outside teams.

In addition a league will be formed, consisting of teams of club members interested in this line of sport. There will be a series of competitions to the winners, of which will be awarded a suitable trophy.

New floors have been laid in the bowling alleys. The season will open on October 7 and there will be a long series of games between teams of the members, lasting until early spring, when a tournament will probably be held.

The members of the board of directors extend a cordial invitation to the Catholic young men of the city and their fathers to pay a visit to the club house and to make an inspection of the building.
