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FLORIDA CAMPHOR GROVE.

One of 2000 Acres Started by a Manufacturer Concern.

Secretary James Wilson, of the Department of Agriculture, in a recent address delivered before the American Club of Pittsburgh, declared that the United States was successfully experimenting in the production of camphor. He said, in part: "For years the Department has been distributing camphor tree seed and thousands of trees are now growing throughout the South and in the Pacific Coast States. Two years ago a serious effort was made to develop the manufacture of camphor from these trees."

"By improvements in manufacturing processes satisfactory results have been accomplished and a large manufacturing concern is now building up a camphor grove of 2000 acres in Florida, from which it hopes to make its camphor. This firm uses more than \$200,000 worth of camphor every year."

Hardening Iron.

When phosphorus is applied to heated iron it has the effect of facilitating the absorption of carbon by the iron. By taking advantage of this fact a new iron-hardening process has been invented in Germany. With the aid of phosphorus, carbon is caused to penetrate the iron rapidly to a considerable depth and as it becomes so hard at a depth of about a millimeter that it can be neither cut nor chipped with the best chisel. At the same time the welding properties of the iron are not injuriously affected.

Remove Fountain Pen When Stuck.

When a fountain pen becomes stuck so it cannot be unscrewed with the fingers a good plan, says Popular Mechanics, is to place a strip of fine emery cloth around the part to be unscrewed, with the emery side in, and clamp the ends in a vice as shown.
