In Bolivia, anti-clericalism is spreading. The state has severed diplomatic relations with the Holy See.

Archbishop Fennelly of Cashel, has sent a check for \$50 as his subscription to Irish Parliamentary fund for the current year.

The Chilean government has appropriated \$15,000 to aid the rebuilding of the hospital of San Juan de Doi, at Valparaiso, destroyed in the earthquake of last year.

Fifteen cardinals have died during the reign of Pope Pius X. The Pontiff himself is 72, but his health bids fair to rival that of Leo XIII in his old age.

The republic of Chile is preparing to erect a monument to Bernardino O'Higgins, the liberator of that country. The committee proposes to erect the monument on the site of the battlefield of Maipu.

Bishop Jones has granted authority to the Spanish colony, represented by Casion Espanol, to transfer the remains of Ponce de Leon, explorer and first governor of Porto Rico, from the San Jose Church to the Cathedral.

In China there are about five hundred Catholic Chinese nuns, and perhaps 4,000 who live a life of virginity in the world. There are Chinese Sisters of Mercy, with Chinese Superiors. Besides these, in one convent, there are 21 Chinese Carmelite Sisters.

A number of business men in Quimper, France, have had a notice put up on the walls of that city to the effect that the departure of the Ursulines, the Ladies of Retreat and the Ladies of the Sacred Heart represents for local business an annual deficit of 100,000 francs a month.

Most Rev. Atenogenes Silva, Archbishop of Michoacan, Mexico, is in receipt of the Grand Cross of Isabel the Catholic, presented by King Alfonso of Spain. With the decoration came a gold chalice, with a suitable inscription, and photographs of the King and Queen of Spain.
