John Toole, one of Geneseo's oldest and well known business men, died suddenly at his meat market on Friday evening last. Mr. Toole appeared to be in good health and the news of his death was a shock to every one in the village. He had been doing some business with the bank, and while telephoning after arriving at his market with one of the employees, he was stricken with apoplexy. At the time Chas. Fernbach was helping in the market and while waiting on a customer he heard the receiver of the telephone drop and saw Mr. Toole sink down behind his desk. He at once summoned a physician, but he had expired before reaching him. Soon after he was taken to his late home on Center St. Mr. Toole was born in this town and has always resided here. When a young man he learned the meat business and for the past thirty years he has carried on that business. He was a man held in the highest esteem, quiet in his demeanor and honest in all his transactions. He was a member of the C. M. B. A. and a honorary member of the Big Tree Hook & Ladder Co., had been trustee of the village for a number of years, and was one of the trustees of the District School, No. 5, at the time of his death. Deceased was 58 years old and is survived by one son, Chas. D., one daughter, Mary J., and one sister, Mrs. Margaret Martin, all of this village.

John, wife of John Toole, who had been ill for some time past, and undoubtedly the sudden death of her husband hastened her death, which occurred Monday morning at 10 o'clock. Mr. Toole was respectfully interred in the common grave of his many friends will
