HOLY REDEEMER.

The regular monthly mass meeting under the auspices of the Rochester Diocesan Federation of Catholic Men was held last Sunday evening in the Holy Redeemer parish hall. Despite the inclemency of the weather a large number attended and followed with interest the arguments of the speakers.

After Joseph Ribstein, president of the local federation, had called the meeting to order, he introduced Frank K. Fisher, the chairman of the evening who made a brief address and who was in turn followed by Rev. J. F. Staub, who welcomed those present and expressed the hope that the meeting would be a most interesting one.

A mixed chorus sang Handel's Largo, after which Joseph A. Schneider delivered an address in German, telling of the relations between the press and the Catholics. The speaker said that of late there had been much improvement, but that there was room for more.

After Eugene Bopp sang an Ave Maria by Massagall, William J. McCluskey of Syracuse made an eloquent speech telling those present of the advantages of an organization like the diocesan federation and exhorting the men present to be loyal to it. A male chorus rendered a selection and Hon. John M. Murphy was introduced.

Judge Murphy spoke on "The Mission of the Federation," and for an hour held his listeners entranced by the beautiful flow of language and his fervent oratory. He pleaded for a putting aside of the old racial prejudices and urged the Catholics to stand together for the advancement of the Church.

The concluding speaker was Alphonse J. Sigl, who told of the duties incumbent upon the Catholic citizen. He deplored the fact that too often Catholics are prone to sit idly by and criticize existing conditions, the remedy for which lies in their own hands. He asked his auditors to take a lively interest in the affairs of the day and to be ready for defense whenever the rights of the Church are impugned.
