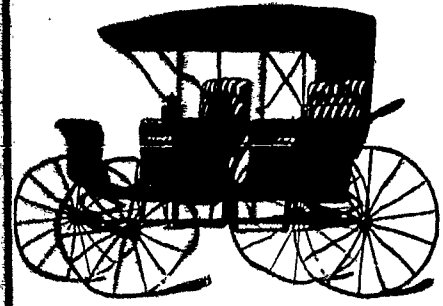

"Modernism" Charges made by Rev. Dr. Breen

Bishop McQuaid Gives Out Statement of Faculty.

Resolutions of Students

Statements in the Associated Press dispatches from Rome recently to the effect that charges of "modernism" that were evidently delaying the appointment of Rev. Dr. E. J. Hanna of Rochester, who is a candidate for the position of coadjutor archbishop of San Francisco, emanated from one of his fellow professors at St. Bernard's Seminary, led Bishop McQuaid this week to give out a statement, signed by all the professors except one, declaring that they had made no such charges against Dr. Hanna. The professor who refused to sign was Rev. Andrew E. Breen, and he has acknowledged that it was he who made the charges.

The statement drawn and signed by the members of the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary follows:

Whereas, It appears from the Associated Press dispatches from Rome of January 11th that the complaints adverse to Rev. Dr. Hanna as a candidate for the coadjutorship of San Francisco have come from a professor at St. Bernard's Seminary:

We, the undersigned, professors of St. Bernard's Seminary, declare, each for himself, that we have not sent to Rome any charge or accusation affecting Dr. Hanna's morals, soundness in the faith or correctness in teaching, nor have we participated with anyone else in sending similar charges to Rome, and we heartily resent the imputation that any one of our body should be guilty of such an act.

The students of the Seminary also have adopted the following resolutions:

The resolutions are:
Whereas, The Rev. Edward J. Hanna, D. D., having been prominently mentioned as a candidate for one of the greatest dignities in the American hierarchy and the matter being now held in abeyance because of charges brought against his orthodoxy.

Whereas, We the students of the various departments of St. Bernard's Seminary, having been intimately associated with Dr. Hanna, some for two, three, or four years as members of his class in dogmatic theology and all having felt the benefits of his spiritual influence.

Whereas, During this period of student association we have been impressed with his characteristic as a professor, namely, his humility in expressing his own opinions, his deference to the opinions of others, his constant obedience to authority, his reverence for the traditions of the Fathers as well as the magisterium of the church, his respect for the Schola Theologica, his intolerance of error and his tolerance for the erring.

Whereas, We, having likewise been edified by his precepts and example, his charity for all without exception, his zeal for the glory of God, the salvation of souls and the honor of the church; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the entire student body of St. Bernard's Seminary, having had every opportunity of observing both his theological teaching and his practice of Christian virtues, take this occasion to express our commendation of him as a model instructor and true priest, deserving and inspiring our imitation; and further be it

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be presented to Dr. Hanna as a testimonial of our affection and also

That, as an act of justice to a professor, a copy be presented to the rector of the seminary, the Rt. Rev. B. J. McQuaid, D. D., together with an expression of our loyalty to this institution and finally that a copy be forwarded to Our Holy Father and the Congregation of the Propaganda as a proclamation of our steadfast faith and filial devotion to the Sacred Congregations, our Holy Father, Pope Pius X, now gloriously reigning, and to the Holy Roman Catholic Church.

Drawn up by the undersigned committee on the initiative of the students and unanimously adopted in a meeting of the entire student body this 14th day of January, 1908.

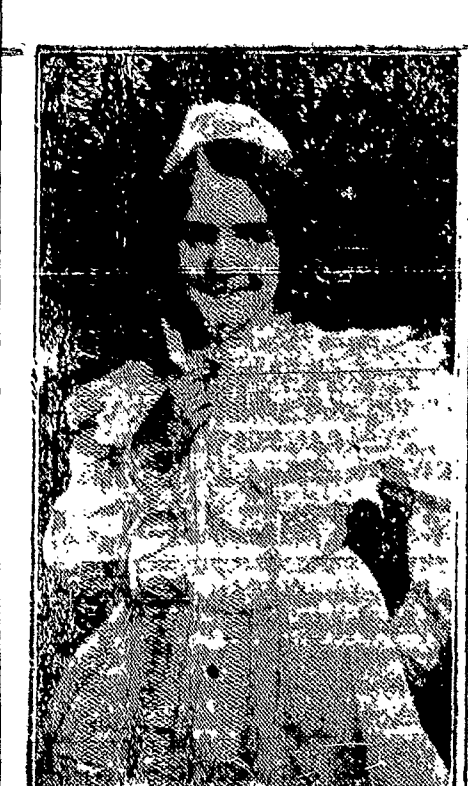
