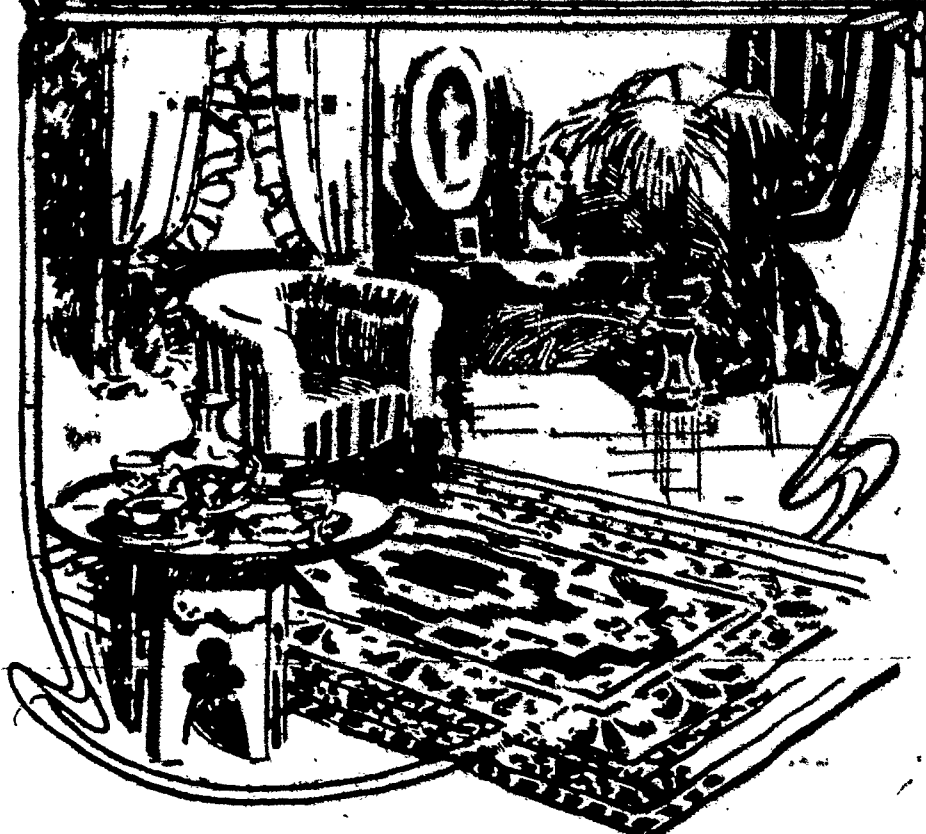

The Ladies' Auxiliary of St. Joseph's Church are making preparations for a "Washington Tea," for the benefit of the Tower Fund.

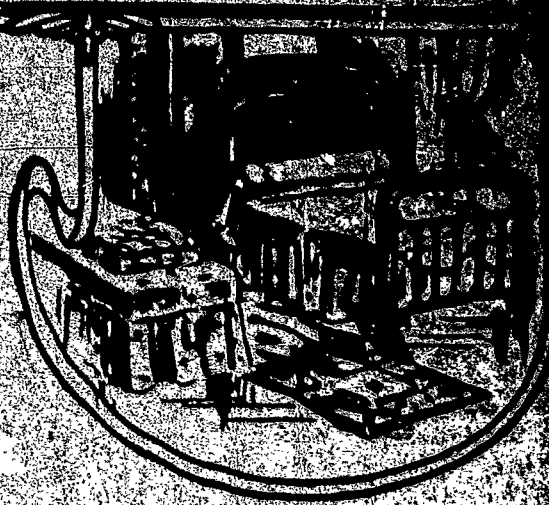
It will be a fitting celebration of the birthday of our first President. Tea will be served by true daughters of the Revolution.
