To Mrs. Driscoll religion was everything, but she was a devoted wife and mother, ever helpful, self-sacrificing and affectionate. Her heart deep and gracious took in all humanity and by her kindly smile or helpful word she has led many along the right path. During the war of the rebellion she was left to rear a helpless family of six children, lavishing on them a mother's undying love and a father's zealous care. She was one of the pioneer members of St. Patrick's church and all her life she was a most zealous church worker. She was also a charter member of the Rosary, Altar and Scapular Society, which attended the funeral in a body. Mrs. Driscoll was a model Christian wife and mother and hers was a lovely Christian death. The remains were brought to the home of her son, Daniel E., in this village, Monday, accompanied by her surviving children and their wives. The funeral was held on Wednesday at 9 a. m. from the residence and at 9:30 from St. Patrick's church, Rev. William T. Dunn officiating. As the remains were being borne from the church, Miss Mary Bacon effectively rendered the Ave Maria, which hymn was an especial favorite of the deceased. Burial was in Greenmount Cemetery.
