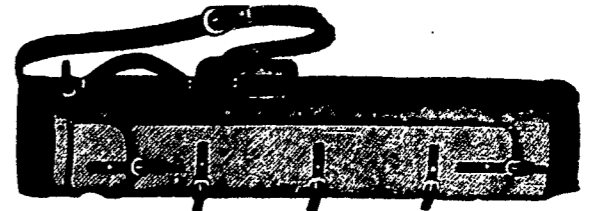
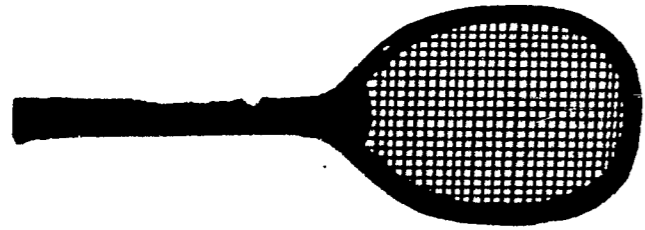

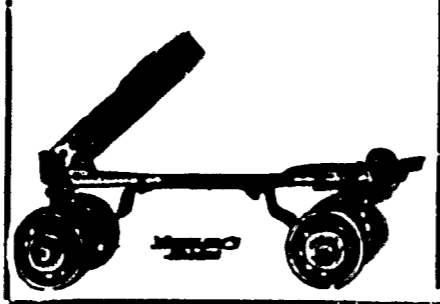

Catholic News From Many Places.

The Rev. Dr. Antonio S. Paredes had been elected vicar-capitular of the archdiocese of Mexico, over which he will rule until the appointment of a new Archbishop. Dr. Paredes is descended from, or belongs to the same family as the famous General Mariano Paredes y Arrillaga, who was president of the republic and figured so prominently in Mexican politics about the middle of last century.

Rev. Father William Morrissey, who died recently at Hotel Dieu, Chatham, Ontario, at the age of 68 years, was known widely as the "doctor priest." He had studied medicine in Rome and practiced gratuitously, patients coming from all parts of the country to consult him.

Rev. Thomas McElligot, S. J., widely known in the South, died on May 4 at Macon, Ga. He was born at Listowel, County Kerry, Ireland, December 21, 1843.

At the G. A. R. memorial services held at Convention Hall, Buffalo, May 24, Rev. Francis T. Parr, C. S. S. R., pastor of St. Mary's Church, delivered the address.

Revs. James J. Sheehan, of the Sacred Heart Church, Newark; James A. Sullivan, of St. Aloysius, Jersey City; Thomas J. Kiernan, of St. Michael's, Passaic, and J. J. Smith, of Holy Rosary, Elizabeth, all in the Newark Diocese, celebrated their silver jubilees this week.

Rev. Mastin Biggane, who has been attached to St. Cecilia's church in Brooklyn for some time, has been called to Washington to become assistant secretary to the Most Rev. Diomedes Falconio, the Papal Delegate to the United States. The appointment is a temporary one. Father Biggane succeeds the Rev. Father Stikney, who has been appointed secretary to Cardinal Gibbons. He was ordained in Rome only two years ago.
