The Widow of Niam

The dead man is a figure of a sinner dead in the eyes of God, deprived of every spiritual good, and of the strength to do works for life eternal.

The sorrowful mother who followed the bier was a figure of the church, which never loses sight of those of her children whom sin has deprived of life. She continually prays for their communion fervently and constantly from the mercy of God through the merits of Jesus Christ.

By today's Gospel our Divine Master wished to teach us that for the conversion of a sinner, who is a slave of his passions and bad habits, a powerful and special grace is necessary, which almost like a miracle stops the course of the predominant passions, and hinders them from going further. Oh, how should habitual sinners tremble when they reflect that God gives this grace out of pure mercy, not withstanding our unworthiness, and that He does not give it to all, but only to whom He pleases, and when and how He pleases, for no man can merit this grace.
