Michael D. Breen died at 1:15 o'clock Monday afternoon at St. Mary's Hospital. He had suffered for some time from an ulcer of the stomach and was taken ill on Sunday at his home 37 Cameron St. He was removed to St. Mary's Hospital and was operated on Sunday.

Mr. Breen was born in Ireland May 1, 1850, and came to the United States when 6 years of age, making his home in Avon. Twelve years ago he removed to Rochester and soon became prominent in the business and fraternal life of the city. At the time of his death he was the Democratic candidate for county purchase agent. He was a member of the Eagles, C. M. B. A., Red Men, Hibernians and Commercial Travelers. Mr. Breen is survived by his wife, Arlene Breen; and six children by a former marriage, Helen, Anna, Margaret, John, Edward and Harold Breen; two brothers, Rev. Andrew E. Breen, of this city, and John Breen, of New York, and a sister, Mrs. Jas. Brennan of Avon.

HERMAN S. SEARLE

Nominated for Congress by Democratic Convention

Speaker "Joe" Cannon of the House of Representatives and his methods were severely criticised by Herman S. Searle, Democratic candidate for Congress, at a meeting of Fifth ward Democrats held in Peter's Hall, Lowell street, Mr. Searle said in the part:

"In this campaign much has been said about Speaker Cannon of the House of Representatives.

"No man knows the ear-like power that Speaker Cannon has wielded better than congressmen in the last session of Congress. No bill could be reported from a committee in the House without Mr. Cannon allowed it to be reported. He could and did without an effort to crush members humbly before the House if they attempted any move without his consent.

"It is unamiable to define what particular Christian virtue he tried to emulate in this line of action. God and he, only know, and Mr. Cannon won't tell.

"According to the Constitution of the United States, the House of Representatives is to represent the people. High-handed Mr. Cannon sits upon the lid of legislation so tight that atmospheric pressure cannot remove it, and even the big stick, with his strenuous messages to Congress, only made it jar a little, and settle more firmly into place.

"When a member arises, backed by the high esteem of his constituents, to place some important matter before the House, and is hurled bodily from his pedestal of honorable effort, he wonders where the Constitution of the United States comes in to give its people a voice in its affairs. If your Congressmen are elected only to be the mouthpieces of an autocratic speaker of the House, why it makes no difference whom you elect. If you expect your Congressman to do things, elect him on a platform that stands for action. It is action that is needed.
