Catholic deaf mutes of the city to the number of 75 at a meeting held recently in St. Joseph's Parish Hall on Franklin st. formed an organization, "The Epheta Society," for the temporal and spiritual welfare of its members. Rev. Wm. Kessel, C. S. R. rector of the church, and his assistant, Rev. A. Engelhardt are the spiritual advisers.

This is the first organization of this character ever in Rochester and it is exciting a large amount of interest. Bishop Hekey has expressed himself as being gratified by the great success achieved by the two priests mentioned in their efforts to care for those afflicted Catholics.

A large amount of labor has been expended by Father Kessel and Father Engelhardt in preparing for this work. Several months

ago they started learning the manual language and the host of signs necessary for rapid expression of thought without the use of words.

Some few deaf mutes became interested and these in turn brought others, so that at present every second Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock a large number gather in the parish hall. After a prayer by one of the priests there is a religious instruction, given and questions are answered, which are propounded by those present.

Last Thursday evening the members of the newly formed Epheta Society held a social in the basement of the school building. The evening was spent playing games, enjoying refreshments and becoming acquainted. Rev. A. Engelhardt made an address of welcome in the sign language.

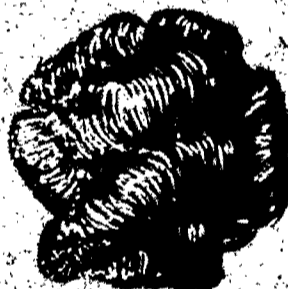
Cook Opera House.
