Bishop McQuaid, 86 years old. Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, bishop of the Diocese of Rochester, passed his 86th birthday quietly at the episcopal residence in Frank St. Tuesday. The Bishop was able to occupy an easy chair and receive many of the priests of the diocese. Bishop McQuaid is the second oldest Catholic bishop in America. He was born in New York city on Dec. 15, 1823, was ordained to the priesthood January 16, 1848, and consecrated bishop of Rochester July 12, 1868.
