Next Sunday will be communion Sunday for the Rosary Society. There will be a meeting of this Society at 4 o'clock.

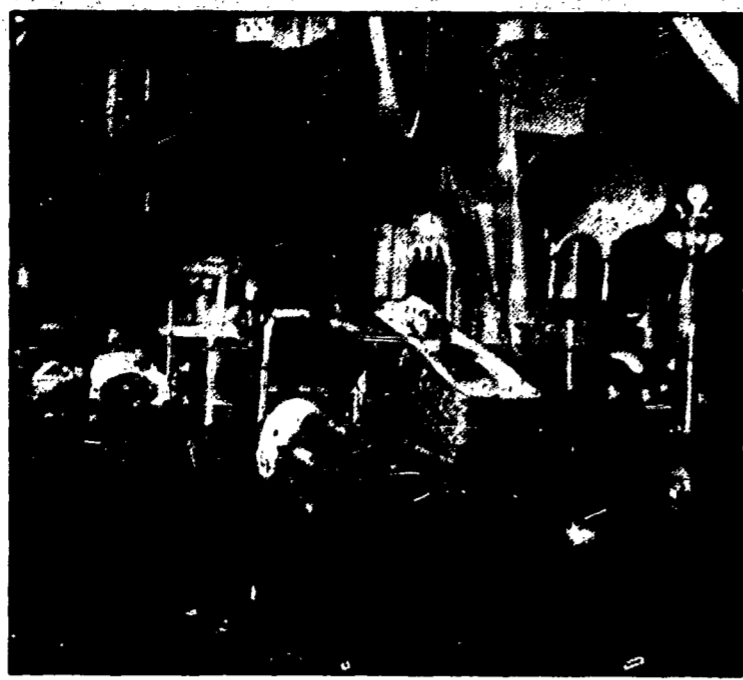
OUR LADY OF VICTORY.
