Next Friday will be the first Friday in February and masses will be at 6, 7 and 8 o'clock. Confessions will be heard Thursday afternoon and evening.

Next Tuesday will be Candlemas Day. At 9 o'clock the blessing of candles will take place followed by a solemn high mass.

The feast of St. Blaise falls on Wednesday and throats will be blessed in the morning after the masses and at 7:30 in the evening.
