Camper's Charcoal Furnace
 Every camper should have a drop in or sheetiron bucket with a flat cover to use as a charcoal furnace in the tent on cold nights and rainy days. A row of small holes around the sides, about two inches from the bottom, or the line of holes with broken stones or sand. Make it a rule to scatter the embers over, line an open fire is used, and gather the charcoal in the bucket and keep dry. Cooking can be done in the tent free from smoke, and when a gentle heat all night is desired, put on the cover, leaving a small opening for draught. With this heater any camper can be comfortable, even under the most adverse circumstances.—C. J. C.
