CATHEDRAL.

A meeting of the Men's Sodality will be held Sunday evening at 7:15. An address on "St. Patrick" will be delivered by Rev. John B. Sullivan, of Corpus Christi church. Every man in the parish is cordially invited to be present at the meeting.

St. Patrick's day will be celebrated with due solemnity next Wednesday in the Cathedral. A pontifical high mass will be celebrated at 10 o'clock by Rt. Rev. Bishop Hickey.

The panegyric will be delivered by Rev. Francis J. Naughton, R. of Hornell N. Y., St. Patrick's day.

The annual retreat for the men is announced to begin Sunday evening March 28th.

The first trial of congregational singing took place last Sunday at the 10:30 high mass, and was successful.
