Death of Rev. Angelo Ingers. Rev. Angelo Ingers died of the native plague in Italy near Palermo on Thursday of last week. Father Angelo, by which name he was generally known, was about 70 years of age and had been connected with this diocese more than twenty years. At one time he filled the chair for Italian in St. Bernard's Seminary, and afterwards he had charge of St. Francis' parish, Phelps, where he was greatly beloved by his parishioners. About a year ago he was granted a leave of absence by Bishop McQuaid, which opportunity he embraced to visit the scenes of his childhood in Northern Italy, where he thought to find relief for his ailment. His health did not improve, however, under the genial Italian sun, and he has now been called to his eternal reward.

Funeral of Sister Mary James

The funeral of Sister Mary James Collins of the Order of St. Joseph, who died Thursday of last week, was held last Saturday in the chapel of St. Patrick's Girl's Orphan Asylum. Solemn requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. John Killam, assisted by Rev. J. Emil Gofell as deacon, Rev. J. Sullivan as sub-deacon, and Rev. A.B. Meenan as master of ceremonies. Sister James had been a member of the order more than 43 years and had been connected with St. Patrick's Orphan Asylum most of this time. She was beloved not only by the parentless little ones placed under her care, but by all with whom she came in contact during the many years of her life, devoted to one of the noblest tasks imaginable.
