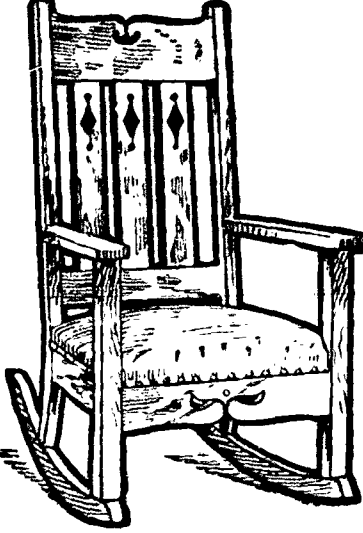
Cement-Protected Iron.

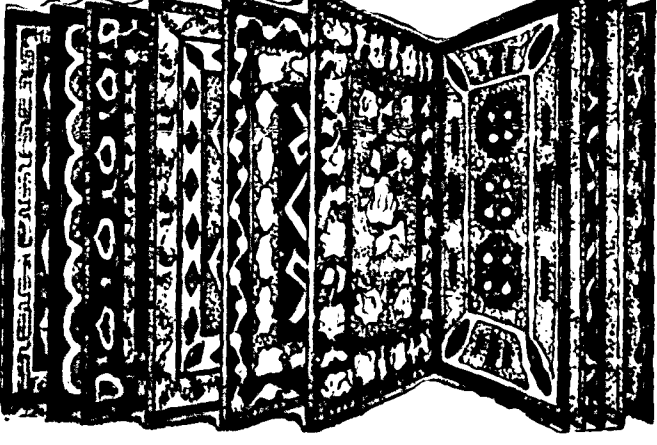

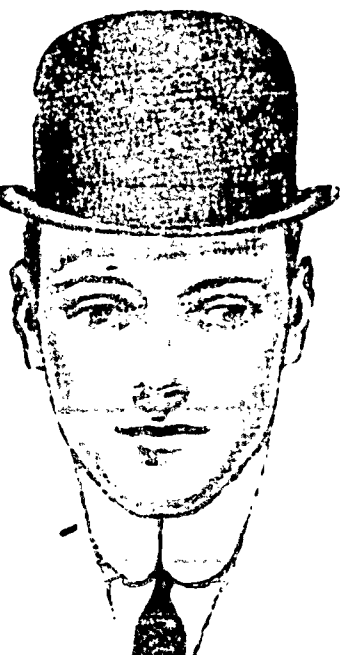
