St. Mary's.

O'Neil of the Immaculate late addressed the men, and was greatly enjoyed by all who heard him. These meetings will be held every three months and it is planned to have a speaker on each occasion. After Lent, little social events will be held which will be under the auspices of the several bands.

A meeting will be held Sunday afternoon of the Rosary Society. Mrs. Courtney of Cortland, N. Y. is the guest of the Misses McNulty of Meigs St.

The members of the Rosary Society are invited to monthly communion Sunday.

Confirmation will be administered by our Rt. Rev. Bishop in May. A class of adults was organized last week.

At the meeting of the Rosary Society Sunday a stereopticon lecture on the life of Christ will be given in the church hall.

There will be no services next Wednesday evening as the evening will be given to the hearing of confessions. Communion will be given on Holy Thursday at 6, 7 and 8 o'clock.

The services each morning during Holy week will begin at 8 o'clock. On Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock there will be a reading of the Passion and the stations of the cross. On Friday evening the sermon will be delivered by Rev. Father Kelly of Spencerport, followed by the stations of the cross.

 The Rosary Society will meet on Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The blessing of the palms will take place at the 10:30 o'clock mass on Sunday, after which they will be distributed.

Sunday is communion day for the boys of the school.

Cathedral.

The men's retreat which has been in progress during this week will close Sunday evening with services at 7:30. Rev. Mulry, the Jesuit who is conducting the retreat will preach the final sermon and will bless religious articles. It is indeed an edifying example to see how the men have entered into the spirit of the retreat, and are doing all in their power to better their lives and sanctify their souls. The 5:30 mass has been very well attended and a large proportion of the men have received holy communion daily as the Jesuit Father desired. The men will receive holy communion Sunday at the 7:30 mass in a body.

Beside the procession of the Blessed Sacrament led by the students and priests, the Passion of Our Lord will be sung.

We call the attention of our parishioners to the holy week services which will take place in the Cathedral next week. These services consisting of masses in the morning and tenebrae in the afternoon are the most solemn services of the year and all who are able should attend them.
