CITY PARISH NEWS

Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporters Cathedral.

What is considered the most successful men's retreat ever held in the Cathedral, was closed Sunday evening with a sermon by the Rev. Father Mulry, S. J., who worked very zealously for the men during the week, and has reason to be elated over the work accomplished. A wonderful expression of Catholic loyalty and faith was shown at the 7:30 mass when about 900 men approached the altar and received into their breasts the bread of life. It was a sight that was good to behold and surely will bring many blessings upon the parish. Before giving solemn benediction Rt. Rev. Bishop Hickey congratulated the men on their good work and exhorted them to frequent holy communion.

At the 10:30 solemn high mass Easter Sunday, Rev. Edward J. Hanna will preach, "The Risen Christ and New Life."

Next Thursday evening April 15th an athletic night will be held in Cathedral hall when exhibitions of athletic work will be given by the members of the Cathedral athletic club under the direction of Mr. Charles Fay.

The school children are now on a vacation which will close the week after Easter.

BLESSED SACRAMENT.

Beginning Monday morning, the mass each day will be at 7 o'clock.

A solemn high mass will be sung at 10:30 Sunday.

On account of Easter falling on the second Sunday of the month, the meeting of the Holy Name Society was held last Sunday evening.

Nearly fifty beautifully colored slides illustrating the principal incidents in the closing days of Our Blessed Lord's life were shown to the members of the different societies last Sunday in the church hall.

The purpose of the Easter collection which will be taken up at the masses Sunday will be to pay one thousand dollars on the church property. The envelopes were distributed at the different masses last Sunday.

St. Mary's.

Michael Barry, aged 70 years, died on Tuesday morning at the family residence in South Ave. The deceased was one of the oldest residents of St. Mary's parish and was respected by all. He is survived by his wife Eliza Jane, two daughters, Mrs. Harry Wilson and Mrs. Wm. Nolan, four sons, William C., Frank L., Walter M., and Thomas B. Barry. The funeral was held on Friday morning at 9:30 from St. Mary's church.

The sermon on Good Friday night was given by Rev. Dr. Hanna of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Envelopes were distributed Sunday for the annual Easter collection.

The order of services for Sunday are mass as usual with a solemn high mass at 10:30. In the evening at 7:45 solemn vespers and benediction will be held.

St. Bridget's.

Rumors are rife of several weddings to take place soon after Easter.

The Easter services will be enhanced by the new mass rendered by the male choir under Prof. Dusek.

The church begins to show the effect of the artistic work of the last two months and promises to be very beautiful when finished.

The attendance at the Lenten season has been very large, notwithstanding the dismantled condition of the church.

Next Wednesday evening there will be held in the school hall a dance and a lunch Box social under the direction of Mrs. T. Beuchman.

Never before in the history of the parish did the young people manifest more enthusiasm than in the preparation of a minstrel entertainment to be held April 19, and 20 at the Holy Redeemer hall. The best amateur and professional talent in the city has been engaged, and it is safe to say a most enjoyable exhibition will be placed on the boards.

There will be a dance Wednesday evening April 16th, 1908, in Vainot Hall, Cox building, under the auspices of Mrs. M. O'Brien and Mrs. John O'Brien for the benefit of St. Bridget's church.

St. Joakim's.

Easter Sunday will be observed in this church with special services. At 10:30 there will be a solemn high mass and in the evening at 7:30 o'clock there will be solemn vespers and benediction. The services will be rendered doubly enjoyable by the fact that it will be the first time the organ will be used since it was put in the hands of C. M. Toplift, about two months ago for a thorough overhauling and rebuilding. Since then the instrument has been made practically new and many of the most modern improvements have been added. Charles J. Stupp, the organist and choirmaster has arranged special music for all the services Sunday.

Sunday will be monthly communion day for the married women of the Holy Family.

The special collection to defray the expenses incidental to rebuilding the organ and the installation of a new lighting system will be taken up after the elevation at all of the masses Sunday.

Next Sunday will be monthly communion and conference day for the young men of the Holy Family and communion day for the Sunday school boys.

The members of the Ladies Auxiliary are planning for an elaborate dramatic production to be given in the near future. The members of the company have been rehearsing a sacred drama for some time and an adequate production is assured.

The services for holy week this year were of special beauty. All those who attended were edified because of the solemnity connected with the various observances. The members of the choir added their share by singing some beautiful and impressive music.
