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**NEW ITALIAN CHURCH.**

The construction of the second Italian church in this city will be commenced shortly. The new church will be erected in Ontario street. The structure will be of brick, two stories high, 65 feet wide and 120 feet long, with a seating capacity of 900 in the church auditorium, which will be on the second floor, as the first is to be used for school purposes.
