who sought admittance went to the street.

When the two hearse, on the way to church, reached the Government Building at Church and Fitzhugh Sts., they were joined by a detachment of postoffice clerks headed by Postmaster W. S. Whittlesey, the Rochester Musicians Protective Association and the Fifty-fourth Regiment Band.

The procession passed through State St., to Main, Main to North St., North to Franklin to the church. Members of the family and relatives had met at the home, No. 30 Richmond St. and from there were driven to the church, where, as the caaskets were borne down the aisle, they passed to seats near the sanctuary.

First to leave the church were the Musicians Protective Association and the postoffice clerks who formed in two lines as the caaskets were placed in the hearse and stood with uncovered heads, while the Fifty-fourth Regiment Band played "Nearer My God, to Thee." The band led the procession to Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

With a simple service conducted by Dr. E. J. Hanna, of St. Bernard's Seminary, the bodies were committed to the ground.

The bearers were: Flor. J. Louis, Edward Meyer, P. Bachman, Edward Leinen and George Minges; for Miss Caroline Minges, Victor Yawman, F. Meyer, I. Reiss, W. Maier, John Hart and L. Herzing.

Sunday will be Pentecost. There will be a solemn high mass at 10:30 o'clock. In the evening there will be solemn vespers and benediction.

The annual collection for the pope will be taken up after the elevation at all masses Sunday.

Next Thursday afternoon and evening, confessions will be held. The usual Sacred Heart devotions will be held next Friday. There will be exposition of the Blessed Sacrament until after the last mass, when benediction will be given.

Next Sunday will be monthly communion and conference day for the young women of the Holy Family.

The members of Branch 81, C. M. B. A., will receive holy communion Sunday at the 7:30 mass. Rev. William Kessel, C. S. S. R., will officiate at the services. An English sermon will be preached. The boy's choir will render St. Ignace's mass in G, and they will be assisted by members of Br. 81. Prof. C. J. Stupp will preside at the organ.

CATHEDRAL

Pentecost Sunday will be celebrated in the Cathedral with a Pontifical high mass at 10:30. Rev. Bishop Hickey will be celebrant, assisted by the priests of the Cathedral.
