DONATION DAY AT ST. ANN'S.

Public Responded Generously to Aid a Noble Charity.

St. Ann's Home for the Aged was thrown open to its friends and all who wished to become acquainted with its splendid work Wednesday afternoon, and from 2 until 9 o'clock in the evening the rooms and corridors of the institution were thronged, the number in attendance exceeding that of any previous donation day. But one quiet spot in the house was to be found and that was the chapel, to which many visitors withdrew during the reception.

Mrs. Charles H. Wilkin at the treasurer's desk near the entrance was kept busy during the afternoon receiving contributions varying in amount from the \$500 donation of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Kroag to the small offerings of 50-cent pieces and quarters, and the total was considerably over \$2,000.

Women from the Catholic parishes of the city welcomed the guests and showed them about the house. The old ladies themselves, of whom there are at present 122, also gave their welcome, and enjoyed as much as the visitors the pleasures of the reception. The rooms at the sides of the entrance were devoted to fancy work and candy sales, and a thriving business was carried on. Mrs. J. R. Mrs. Kenney gave in a check for \$100, the amount realized by entertainments given lately by the circle.
