In special term of Supreme Court at Buffalo last week before Justice Emery, Attorney F. J. Fitzpatrick in behalf of Thomas J. O'Donnell, former Grand President, sought permission to bring an action declaring the election of the officers of the Supreme Council of the Catholic Relief and Beneficial Association, held last September, illegal on the grounds that certain officers who voted had no right to vote, while others who were entitled to vote were not allowed to do so.

John W. Hogan, a former deputy attorney general, represented the association. The case was set down for June 22.

The Supreme Council is the highest body in the organization and its members are elected by delegates from the grand councils existing in the various states. It is claimed

that at the election, which is now contested by Mr. O'Donnell, there were persons who voted that are not affiliated with any grand council and are merely members of individual councils in states where there are not sufficient councils to constitute a grand council.

At a meeting of the District Commandery of the Rochester Regiment of Knights of St. John held in St. Joseph's Hall recently it was decided that the annual requiem mass for deceased members will be said at 9 o'clock Wednesday evening June 23 in St. Boniface Church. All relatives and friends of deceased Knights are invited to be present at the ceremony.

The annual devotion of the graves of deceased members will take place Sunday morning June 27th. The commissioned and non-commissioned officers of each commandery are appointed to do the work and will assemble promptly at 10 o'clock in the morning at which time the work will commence under the supervision of A. D. C. M. H. Weismiller. Plans and preparations were made for the annual military field day to take place the latter part of August at one of the local resorts to be decided on later.

The intention is to provide new features this year, also a series of athletic events for members and their friends, the winners to receive substantial prizes. Tents will be pitched, camp established and guard duty done. At 3 o'clock in the morning a military parade will be held to be followed by an exhibition drill by the crack commanderies of the Regiment.
