What Pius X Said.

Not so long ago the secular press came out in "scare heads" to the effect that Pius X had declared for woman suffrage. What the Holy Father really said was, "Some people will tell you," said the Pope, "that religion is good only for women. They mean that to be a sign of their contempt for religion but do you accept it in its positive part, and remember that it is really only harsh, it is but just, to require by the sentiment of religion that you can be of efficacious assistance to man, realize the responsibilities of being his helpmate, and sow in the souls of your children that good seed which will make you great in them. Think how vast is your influence over man, whether as father, brother, husband, an influence summed up in the words of Scripture: A good woman makes a good man. But do not think either that women's duties are entirely confined within the circle of their families, for she has also a duty towards her neighbor, to dry the tears of the afflicted, to assuage sorrow, to band together for the alleviation of the spiritual and temporal miseries of those who suffer, thus fulfilling a social mission which makes of her an angel of love in amid human sorrows. I earnestly recommend, therefore, the union for the accomplishment of this social mission. United you will be better able to attain the means necessary for the fulfillment of your duties to your families and to society. You will do well to deepen and broaden your religious knowledge, for the catechism alone is not always sufficient to refute the errors that will come under your notice, and you will need a sound knowledge of the truths of religion in order to instruct your children and to rebut the charges that are being made against the Church. I would suggest also that you give serious attention to the study of pedagogy, so that you may learn the rules for the instruction of the young and become better equipped for the difficult work of education. Today there is a tendency to spoil the child by sparing the rod and to act on the belief that children will grow up good Christians and good citizens when nurtured on kisses and caresses. Then again, if you are to be good housewives you must learn something of the principles of domestic economy, which will enable you to regulate your households with thrift and order. But above all else be assiduous in your religious duties, remembering that while the truly pious woman is the mistress of the house and of the heart of her husband, she becomes the bane of both when she is without faith."

The condolences of Catholics the continent over are extended to the Catholics of Ottawa, Canada, over the sudden death of their beloved archbishop, Monsignor Duhamel, who died from heart disease while making a pastoral visit to Casselman.

At 4 o'clock, accompanied by Fathers Lalonde and Carriere, he reached Casselman. He was accorded a demonstration by the very parishioners who were in a very few short hours to mourn his death, and, smiling and cheerful, make his entry and himself gave benediction of the blessed sacrament. After a good supper he chatted with the priests on the veranda of the parish house at which he was staying, and then retired.

At 10 o'clock Fathers Carriere and Louchette, the parish priests, heard his Grace cry out for assistance, and found him seized with what was only too apparently a fatal attack of heart disease.

His last hours were singularly touching. Breathless at first, he at length grew calmer, but with the cessation of the more violent symptoms of the attack came a growing weakness, which showed that death was not far away. "Conscious to the last, and constantly invoking the three sacred names," said one of those who had been with him, "his end was a most peaceful one."

"The deed of trust to secure the Catholic University of America in the sum of nearly \$900,000, given by the late Thomas E. Waggaman, ex-treasurer of the institution, on the real estate known as Woodley, in the suburbs of Washington, was declared invalid in a decision rendered by Justice Barnard of the district supreme court. The court held that it was an attempt on the part of Waggaman to prefer the claim of the university over creditors to whom he was indebted at the time.

The result of the decision will be to make the university share with the general creditors of Waggaman, instead of assuring them full settlement, as the establishment of the deed of trust would have done. The university is expected to make an appeal, as they claim that they were not aware of Waggaman's insolvency at the time or that he had an intention of preferring their claim."

St. Mary's Hospital reports for May show that there were 133 patients at the hospital on May 1st, and 152 admitted during the month. There were 16 births and three deaths. One hundred and eighty-one patients were discharged and 117 remained in the hospital June 1st. There were 95 ambulance calls, of which 15 were hurr calls. Of these 64 were taken to St. Mary's, four to other hospitals, 24 to homes and stations, and three were not taken.
